2021 was another challenging year for the 12th District. I am proud of what my team and I were able to accomplish last year. I'm particularly proud of our efforts to assist nearly 1,300 constituents with unemployment-related issues, roughly the same number of total cases we worked on in all of 2019. I'm also proud to have helped bring more than \$49 million in state grant funding to the district, with more than \$17 million going to small businesses and non-profit organizations.

■ Together in Harmony **Event**

ver the summer, I was excited to co-host the "Together in Harmony" cultural event in North Wales with the Korean American Association of Greater Philadelphia. Free for community members to enjoy, the event featured Korean food vendors, cultural displays, and a wide range of Korean American organizations – from language schools and health clinics to civic engagement groups. My staff and I were glad to be there to share the services our office can help with.



Supporting Pennsylvania's Nurses

- The pandemic has taken a brutal toll on our healthcare workers, especially our nurses. That's why I'm so proud to have worked with Governor Wolf to dedicate \$6.5 million in pandemic response funds to create the **Nursing Workforce Initiative**, establishing three programs designed to recruit, train and retain Pennsylvania's nursing workforce:
 - \$5M to PHEAA to create the Student Loan Relief for Nurses (SLRN) Program
 - \$1M to the Dept. of Labor & Industry to create nursing apprenticeships & industry partnerships
 - \$500,000 for the Department of Human Services to expand the number of nurse residencies and nurse mentoring programs
- Recognizing the demand for the student loan relief program, I continued to advocate for more funding. In January, the legislature voted unanimously to approve HB 253 (now Act 2 of 2022), which provided an additional \$15 million for loan relief (bringing the total to \$20M) and \$210 million for health care workforce supports, funded by federal American Rescue Plan dollars
- I am hopeful this is just the beginning. I'll continue to push our legislative leaders and the administration for even more funding to support programs like SLRN that will attract and keep health care workers and other essential workers on the job.



Student Loan Relief for Nurses (SLRN) Program

he SLRN Program officially launched in January 2022, and applications will be accepted until March 1, 2022. The loan relief program will provide selected qualified nurses with up to \$2,500 for each year they work at a qualified nursing facility, with a maximum benefit of \$7,500.

2021 Health Fairs

In November, I hosted two community health fair events, one at Grace Lutheran Church in Hatfield, and another at the Willow Grove YMCA. Both fairs offered a wide range of health and wellness resources, including insurance, nutrition, mental health services, medical marijuana info, physical therapy and more. We also teamed up with local pharmacies, Skippack Pharmacy and Eric's RX Shoppe to offer flu shots and COVID vaccines. I look forward to planning our 2022 health fairs and connecting constituents to these important resources.

Are You Eligible for the PFAS Health Study?



ur region is one of only seven sites chosen across the U.S. to take part in this groundbreaking federally-funded multi-site study on the health impacts of PFAS exposure. PFAS, or "forever chemicals," spread into our soil and groundwater from firefighting foams used on local military bases in Warminster and Horsham.

- Eligibility:
 - The study team is currently recruiting adults (ages 18+) and children (ages 4-17) who lived in the following Bucks and Montgomery townships between 2005 and 2017:
 - Horsham, Ivyland, Warminster, Warrington, Abington, Hatboro, Northampton, Upper Dublin, Upper Moreland, Upper Southampton, or Warwick.
 - Children whose mothers lived in these areas between 2005 and 2017, prior to their child's birth, may also be eligible to participate.

WHAT WE'VE PASSED

The legislative process can be slow and frustrating, but I was proud to sponsor several bills that were signed into law this session, including:

Expanding Access to Affordable Medication

In December, the legislature passed HB 1260. Now Act 94, this law expands income eligibility for PACENET, our low-income prescription drug assistance program, so more seniors can access it. I was proud to be a prime sponsor of the Senate version of this bill, SB 668.

■ Supporting Ventilator Patients

SB 108, now Act 56, will increase Medicaid funding to facilities providing ventilator care, allowing Pennsylvanians who depend on these services to remain where they are comfortable and stay out of the hospital, where costs are higher and outcomes could be worse.

■ Boosting Breast Cancer Research Funds

SB 445, now Act 23, gives individuals renewing their vehicle registration or driver's license an option to donate to the Pennsylvania Breast Cancer Coalition for breast cancer research efforts.

Harrisburg Update

ROOM FOR PROGRESS

Each day I'm in Harrisburg, I'm advocating for the issues that matter most to you.

■ Putting Federal ARP Funds to Use

Pennsylvania is sitting on billions of dollars of unspent federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds. These funds were allocated with the understanding they'd be used to provide direct and immediate support for residents and businesses struggling due to the COVID crisis, not sit in reserves. My colleagues in the Democratic Caucus and I have introduced several proposals to get that money to small businesses, childcare facilities, schools, healthcare workers and more. I'll continue to push for these funds to be released and look forward to working with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to get this done, like we recently did with Act 2.

Raising the Minimum Wage

In 2022, the minimum wage will increase in 25 states, but not Pennsylvania. Our legislature hasn't voted to increase the minimum wage since 2006. Too many of our essential workers are earning poverty wages, and nearly 70% of PA residents think it's time for a raise.

■ Paid Family Leave

The bipartisan Family Care Act (SB 580), of which I am a prime sponsor, would establish a paid family and medical leave program for working Pennsylvanians. This bill will keep our economy competitive with other states and make sure workers can take the time they need to care for themselves or loved ones.

■ Patient Safety Act

With a growing number of bipartisan cosponsors in both the House and Senate, it's time to make safe nurse-to-patient ratios a reality in Pennsylvania. My bill, the Patient Safety Act (SB 240) is key to retaining and recruiting the skilled staff we need to keep our healthcare system afloat.

■ Gun Safety

Each session, we see the majority push drastic legislation unwinding what few gun regulations exist, such as their SB 565, which would have eliminated the permit requirement and lowered the age to carry a concealed firearm, while they refuse to even discuss popular commonsense gun safety measures. I'll continue to stand up against these bad bills and advocate for legislation in line with your priorities, like my SB 625, which would allow local municipalities to implement gun safety ordinances on their own properties; SB 134, which would allow a court to temporarily suspend an individual's access to firearms if there is evidence that they are a threat to themselves or others; and SB 581, which would require gun owners to safely store firearms when not under direct control of the owner.

■ Clean Water

While I'm excited that both the US EPA and PA DEP are working on establishing maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for the dangerous, currently unregulated PFAS chemicals that leached into the soil and water surrounding local military bases, that process will take years. That's why I continue to push so hard for my bills, SB 611 and SB 612, which will set interim MCLs for PFOA and PFOS and formally classify them as "hazardous substances," finally allowing us to force largescale clean-up efforts at these sites and make the polluters – not local taxpayers – bear the costs.

The Jefferson Institute for Bioprocessing (JIB) is the first specialized education and training institute for biopharmaceutical processing in North America. After helping to secure major grant funding for JIB in 2019, I was excited to see the facility at Spring House Innovation Park in Lower Gwynedd for myself in September.




It was great to be back at the Hatfield History Museum for their ribbon cutting and grand opening event in October. The museum features iconic signage, items from historic businesses, family records, and more.
